Dresden, 1913. Benito Mussolini, presently a socialist in exile, plays detective in order to clear a young engineer from the accusation of having murdered his American lover.

Tri Brata

Ukraine, 1941. German Captain Martin Bora is challenged by Russian ethnologist Vladimir Propp to beat the clock, and explain a case of brutal murder before his train reaches the station.

The Conqueror's Face

Milan, 1945. While still a boy, Duca Lamberti (future protagonist of Giorgio Scerbanenco's mysteries) will face his first criminal case in the square where Mussolini's corpse is reviled by a mob.

Syrian Antioch, 1254. Bishop Ardouin and his nephew Roger d'Alteville team up to uncover the

Sarajevo, 1994. A United Nation soldier is found dead. All seems to point to Serbian troops, but they deny any involvement. It will be up to an American reporter to discover the uncomfortable truth.

Ibis redibis

Pannonia, 300 AD. Commander Aelius Spartianus confronts the intricate case of Tribune Biturix's disappearance and apparently unexplainable death.

Onegin

(In Family Day, Sperling & Kupfer, 2008)

Russia, 1943. While on the trail of enemy partisans, Captain Martin Bora stumbled into a series of murders whose prime cause may hail back to the 1917 revolution.

Death, Knight and the Devil

Milan, 1630. While plague ravages the Spanish-ruled Lombard city, *Capitan de Justicia* Olivares leads a frantic quest for the murderer of a pious nun.
